## Serial Inventor Strong Wool Saviour

Serial inventor, 25-year-old Logan Williams has already sold four of his inventions, three to overseas companies, and is embarking on a much bigger mission – to save the strong wool industry in NZ with his new invention. It is a biodegradeable material made of a combination of strong wool and corn starch to make all sorts of products as a replacement for plastic. It is called Keravos. He was named this year in Forbes' 30 under 30 2020. He joined NZ Merino Company a year ago to create a product from coarse wool. He invented the method to combine polylactic acid from corn starch with coarse wool which NZ produces in abundance.

They secured a global provisional patent a couple of months ago and have formed a company called Keravos Limited to make and market the Keravos pellets made of PLA and wool. Keravos is already producing 4000 kilograms (4 tonnes) of the pellets a day. The company is working with local firms Action Plastics and Maisey Group to make the pellets and turn them into products

through a common process called injection moulding. Furniture, pots and crockery have been made. PLA is used around the world as a plastic substitute but combining it with wool is novel. Williams is a millionaire, at 25.

## **NAILE 2020 REPORT**

Best White Fleece on the hoof went to Madison Feehan on the Junior Ewe Lamb and Best Colored Fleece on the hoof went to Lindsey Schmoll on Intermediate Ewe Lamb. Best Romney Ewe Head went to Malorie Schmoll with her White Yearling Ewe. Best Romney Ram Head went to Madison Feehan's NC Intermediate Ram Lamb. Congratulations to all exhibitors, the sheep were well presented and of outstanding quality.

The Open Show was held on Sunday, November 15, 2020. White and Natural Colored had their own divisions, 36 head walked over the green shaving and were judge by Roger High from Ohio. With 2020 coming to an end, we have much to look back on, both good and bad. COVID-19 has affected so many aspects of our lives that we tend to wonder if it will ever end. Our show schedules or lack thereof, combined with our social disconnect, has been disheartening. At the time of writing this article, Maryland Sheep & Wool Festival has just announced that 2021 will be virtual with hopes of a face-to-face in 2022. With that being noted, the face of optimism wants to spread a little cheer.

In November, many thought that NAILE would be cancelled, but with many restrictions the sheep show portion went forward. The Romney Show was well attended (details in another article here in the Ramblings). This year when searching for awards and participation prizes for the Juniors, a company new to me was happened upon, Benchmark Graphics. After some discussion regarding ideas and price points, they developed vinyl banners for each youth exhibitor. They took the ARBA logo and "perked" it up a bit and added a Romney profile to each side. At bottom, each young breeder had their name scrolled in a banner and if they had a farm name, it was placed on there as well. The gifts appeared to be well received and I know one has already been hung in a college dorm room and several have graced bedroom walls until the return of show seasons in the future.

The idea behind these vinyl banners were so the youth could have farm signs to hang at sheep shows that were all their own, that were separate from parents or siblings, so that they could be proud of their own accomplishments. They are so nice, that several requests have been received to have more done for either other kids that didn't show at NAILE or other ARBA members that want farm signs.

I wanted to let everyone know, that ARBA will be placing an order through Benchmark Graphics for additional vinyl banners. Depending on number of orders, price could come down. These are the details as are known now: Vinyl Banners (30x30 on 15 oz. vinyl) with hemming & grommets for hanging, ARBA picture/logo (photo attached to this article), individual's name and farm name. The price is not set-in stone as total number ordered and shipping will have some effect but it should be approximately \$35. I am accepting pre-orders (no money yet please) just to get a feel for how many people are interested and then I will get a confirmation on pricing. 

## **COVID-19 Promoter of Lamb**

Lamb sales have seen increases as the need to quarantine was introduced. The sale of loin cuts increased 13% from last year and a 12% increase was realized for rib cuts. The northeast saw an increase of sales at 10% and the state of California reported a 17% jump.

These numbers, reported by the American Lamb Promotion Board, reflect only supermarket lamb sales.

In our county, southwestern Oregon, the waiting list to have animals processed has grown to several months and hunters wanting deer and elk prepped for their freezers were turned away. The demand for farm direct sales saw an incredible surge. I believe some was related to the health issues being reported and some was a direct result of more home cooks spending extra hours in the kitchen. Regardless of the reasons, my meat lambs were sold out early and I had new customers this year with little or no local advertising.

Welcome new lamb consumers.

## Lamb Added to Food Assistance Programs

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service has purchased 119,700 pounds of lamb rack roasts in response to a September 1 solicitation. The racks will be delivered between October 16 and December 31 for use in child nutrition and other related domestic food assistance programs.

## **NAILE Entries**

Entries for the 2020 sheep show at NAILE show that numbers were down, but that several breeds had good numbers. Topping the list was the Junior Southdown Show with 351 entries received, followed by the Junior Hampshire Show with 285. Romney breeders were at the show, but with 27 sheep entered in the junior show and 37 in the open division.

These numbers are for entries only, not the real numbers that made the trip to Louisville.

The Open Division Wool Show coordinated by the Romney breeders was cancelled this year, but plans remain to keep this project alive for next year.

## ASI Annual Convention

The annual convention of ASI will be held January 28-29, 2021. The officers and staff will meet in Denver with the audiovisual firm to coordinate the virtual convention and two days worth of presentations, panels and speakers.

## **CFAP First Round Results**

Final numbers from the first round of Coronavirus Food Assistance Program payments are being collected, and have provided \$68.9 million to American sheep producers. The second round of funding is in progress, with a due date of December 11 for filing.

Payments for lambs, yearlings and sheep consisted of a single payment based on the number of animals sold between January 15 and April 15. Payment was based on a per head rate. Payments for wool were figured on 50 percent of a producer's 2019 total production or the 2019 inventory as of January 15, 2020.

## **Chicago Store Opens**

Faribault Woolen Mill Co., established in 1865 and maker of handcrafted blankets, decorative throws, apparel and accessories, opened its first-ever Chicago store in the Shops at North Bridge on November 1.

The Faribault Woolen Mill is located in Faribault, Minn., and is one of the longest standing woolen mills in the country, where fifth-generation craftspeople take raw wool through a 22 step process to make blankets and other items.

In addition to the Chicago store opening, the company plans to expand its retail footprint in other American cities in 2021.

## **Livestock Hauling Bill**

U.S. Senator Deb Fischer of Nebraska recently introduced the Haulers of Agriculture and Livestock Safety Act to increase safety and flexibility for the transport of agriculture and livestock products.

The Bill would:

Eliminate the requirement that hours of service exemptions only apply during state designated planting and harvesting seasons.

Amend and clarify the definition of "agricultural commodities".

Authorize a 150 air-mile exemption from requirements on the destination side of a haul for ag and livestock haulers..
